ACD'S REPORT

for the year ended 30 June 2020

Authorised Status

LF Miton Investment Funds ('the Company') is an investment company with variable capital incorporated in England and Wales under registered number IC320 and authorised by the Financial Conduct Authority with effect from 16 April 2004. The Company has an unlimited duration.

It is a UCITS scheme and the base currency of the Company and each sub-fund is pounds sterling.

Shareholders are not liable for the debts of the Company. Shareholders are not liable to make any further payment to the Company after they have paid the price on purchase of the shares.

ACD's Statement

COVID-19

The outbreak of COVID-19, declared by the World Health Organisation as a pandemic on 11 March 2020, caused significant disruption to business and economic activity which was reflected in the fluctuations seen in the global stock markets. In the short time since its emergence the ramifications of COVID-19 and its long term impacts are now being fully recognised, as various national governments continue to provide financial support and stimulus to their economies. In the immediate aftermath of the global recognition of the seriousness of the pandemic there were sharp declines in asset prices and whilst there has been an element of recovery since then, there is now the unknown factor of the most dramatic global recession seen in living memory and how this will translate into future asset pricing. This combined with the fear, in many countries, of a second wave of COVID-19 would indicate that an extended period of instability will exist for some time as governments, society and business seek to understand how COVID-19 can be managed until such time there is a means of immunising the population.

Important Information

With effect from 1 January 2020, the rate of the periodic charge that The Bank of New York Mellon (International) Limited charges as depositary changed. The new rates are as follows:

- £0 to £100 million 0.03%;
- £100 million to £150 million 0.0175%;
- £150 million to £1 billion 0.01%;
- £1 billion to £2 billion 0.005%; and
- £2 billion and above 0.0025%.

The Investment Manager for the Company has changed from Miton Asset Management Limited to Premier Fund Managers Limited on 24 April 2020.

Cross Holdings

No sub-funds had holdings in any other sub-fund of the Company at the end of the year.

Remuneration Policy

Link Fund Solutions Limited ('LFSL') is committed to ensuring that its remuneration policies and practices are consistent with, and promote, sound and effective risk management. LFSL's remuneration policy is designed to ensure that excessive risk taking is not encouraged by or within LFSL including in respect of the risk profile of the funds it operates, to manage the potential for conflicts of interest in relation to remuneration (having regard, inter alia, to its formal conflicts of interest policy) and to enable LFSL to achieve and maintain a sound capital base.

None of LFSL's staff receives remuneration based on the performance of any individual fund.

LFSL acts as the operator of both UCITS funds and Alternative Investment Funds ('AIFs').

LFSL delegates portfolio management for the funds to various investment management firms. The investment managers' fees and expense for providing investment management services are paid by the ACD out of its own remuneration under the ACD agreement. The investment management firms may make information on remuneration publicly available in accordance with the disclosure requirements of Pillar 3 of the Capital Requirements Directive. This disclosure is in respect of LFSL activities (including activities performed by its sister company Link Fund Administrators Limited (LFAL) or by employees of that entity), and excludes activities undertaken by third party investment management firms. LFSL staff do not perform duties in respect of particular funds, nor are they remunerated by reference to the performance of any individual fund. Accordingly, the information below is for LFSL as a whole. No attempt has been made to attribute remuneration to the Company itself.

Information on LFSL's remuneration arrangements is collated annually, as part of its statutory accounts preparation processes. Accordingly, the information disclosed relates to the year ended 30 June 2020, being the most recent accounting period which accounts have been prepared for LFSL prior to the production of these accounts. As at 30 June 2020, LFSL operated 107 UCITS and 93 AIFs, whose respective assets under management ('AuM') were $\mathfrak{L}41,011$ million and $\mathfrak{L}37,140$ million. The Company was valued at $\mathfrak{L}497$ million as at that date and represented 0.64% of LFSL's total AuM and 1.21% of its UCITS AuM.

The amount available for payment of discretionary bonuses is dependent on satisfactory performance by LFSL, and the Link Group as a whole, rather than the performance of any individual fund. Bonuses may then be paid to staff to reflect their contribution to LFSL's success. The precise metrics used vary by function, but consideration is given to both qualitative and quantitative measures.

In preparing the financial statements the ACD is responsible for:

- selecting suitable accounting policies and then applying them consistently;
- making judgements and estimates that are reasonable and prudent;
- following UK accounting standards, including FRS 102 The Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland;
- complying with the disclosure requirements of the Statement of Recommended Practice for UK Authorised Funds issued by the Investment Association in May 2014;
- keeping proper accounting records which enable it to demonstrate that the financial statements as prepared comply with the above requirements;
- assessing the Company and its sub-funds' ability to continue as a going concern, disclosing, as applicable, matters related to going concern;
- using the going concern basis of accounting unless they either intend to liquidate the Company or its sub-funds or to cease operations, or have no realistic alternative but to do so;
- such internal control as they determine is necessary to enable the preparation of financial statements that are free from material misstatement, whether due to fraud or error; and
- taking reasonable steps for the prevention and detection of fraud and irregularities.

The ACD is responsible for the management of the Company in accordance with its Instrument of Incorporation, the Prospectus and the COLL Sourcebook.

STATEMENT OF DEPOSITARY'S RESPONSIBILITIES

The Depositary must ensure that the Company is managed in accordance with the Financial Conduct Authority's Collective Investment Schemes Sourcebook, the Open-Ended Investment Companies Regulations 2001 (SI 2001/1228), as amended, the Financial Services and Markets Act 2000, as amended, (together 'the Regulations'), the Company's Instrument of Incorporation and Prospectus (together 'the Scheme documents') as detailed below.

The Depositary must in the context of its role act honestly, fairly, professionally, independently and in the interests of the Company and its investors.

The Depositary is responsible for the safekeeping of all custodial assets and maintaining a record of all other assets of the Company in accordance with the Regulations.

The Depositary must ensure that:

- the Company's cash flows are properly monitored and that cash of the Company is booked into the cash accounts in accordance with the Regulations;
- the sale, issue, repurchase and cancellation of shares are carried out in accordance with the Regulations;
- the value of shares of the Company are calculated in accordance with the Regulations;
- any consideration relating to transactions in the Company's assets is remitted to the Company within the usual time limits:
- the Company's income is applied in accordance with the Regulations; and
- the instructions of the ACD, which is the UCITS Management Company, are carried out (unless they conflict with the Regulations).

The Depositary also has a duty to take reasonable care to ensure that the Company is managed in accordance with the Regulations and the Scheme documents in relation to the investment and borrowing powers applicable to the Company.

Having carried out such procedures as we consider necessary to discharge our responsibilities as Depositary of the Company, it is our opinion, based on the information available to us and the explanations provided, that in all material respects the Company, acting through the ACD:

Opinion

We have audited the financial statements of LF Miton Investment Funds ('the Company') for the year ended 30 June 2020 which comprise the Statement of Total Return and Statement of Changes in Net Assets Attributable to Shareholders together with the Balance Sheet for each of the Company's sub-funds, the accounting policies of the Company, the related notes for each sub-fund and the Distribution Tables. The financial reporting framework that has been applied in their preparation is applicable law and United Kingdom Accounting Standards (United Kingdom Generally Accepted Accounting Practice) including FRS 102 'The Financial Reporting Standard applicable to the UK and Republic of Ireland'.

In our opinion, the financial statements:

ACCOUNTING AND DISTRIBUTION POLICIES

for the year ended 30 June 2020

1. Accounting Policies

The principal accounting policies, which have been applied to the financial statements of the sub-funds in both the current and prior year, are set out below. These have been applied consistently across all sub-funds unless otherwise stated in the Notes to the Financial Statements of each sub-fund.

(A) BASIS OF ACCOUNTING

The financial statements of each sub-fund have been prepared under the historical cost basis, as modified by the revaluation of investments and in accordance with FRS 102 The Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland. The financial statements have been prepared in accordance with the Statement of Recommended Practice ('SORP') for Financial Statements of UK Authorised Funds issued by the Investment Association ('IA') in May 2014, as amended.

These financial statements are prepared on a going concern basis. The ACD has made an assessment of each sub-fund's ability to continue as a going concern, and is satisfied they have the resources to continue in business for the foreseeable future and is not aware of any material uncertainties that may cast significant doubt on this assessment. This assessment is made as at the date of issue of these financial statements and considers liquidity, declines in global capital markets, known redemption levels, expense projections, key service provider's operational resilience, and the impact of COVID-19.

(B) RECOGNITION OF REVENUE

Dividends on quoted equities are recognised when the securities are quoted ex-dividend.

Distributions from collective investment schemes are recognised when the schemes are quoted ex-distribution. Equalisation returned with the distribution is deducted from the cost of the investment in the scheme and does not form part of the distributable revenue.

Reportable income from funds with 'reporting fund' status for UK tax purposes is recognised when the information is made available by the reporting fund.

Revenue from unquoted equity investments is recognised when the dividend is declared.

Revenue on debt securities is accounted for on an effective yield basis.

Rebates of annual management charges (AMC rebates) from underlying investments are accounted for on an accruals basis and are recognised as revenue, or capital in line with the allocation of the annual management charge between capital and revenue of the underlying investments.

Interest on bank and other cash deposits is recognised on an accruals basis.

Revenue is recognised gross of any withholding taxes but excludes attributable tax credits.

ACCOUNTING AND DISTRIBUTION POLICIES continued

(C) TREATMENT OF EXPENSES

All expenses, except for those relating to the purchase and sale of investments, are charged against revenue.

The Miton Balanced Multi Asset Fund receives a rebate of the expenses to ensure the Operating Charges Figure for the 'B' share classes does not exceed 1.00% and does not exceed 0.90% for the 'F' classes. This rebate is recognised as revenue or capital in line with the treatment of the expenses.

(D) ALLOCATION OF REVENUE AND EXPENSES TO MULTIPLE SHARE CLASSES AND SUB-FUNDS

Any revenue or expense not directly attributable to a particular share class or sub-fund will normally be allocated pro-rata to the net assets of the relevant share classes and sub-funds, unless a different allocation method is deemed more appropriate by the ACD.

All share classes are ranked pari passu and have no particular rights or terms attached, including rights on winding up.

(E) TAXATION

Corporation tax is provided at 20% on taxable revenue, after deduction of allowable expenses.

Offshore income gains, from funds without reporting status, are liable to corporation tax at 20% and any resulting charge is deducted from capital.

Where overseas tax has been deducted from overseas revenue that tax can, in some instances, be set off against the corporation tax payable by way of double tax relief and where this is the case the offset is reflected in the tax charge.

Deferred tax is provided using the liability method on all timing differences arising on the treatment of certain items for taxation and accounting purposes, calculated at the rate at which it is anticipated the timing differences will reverse. Deferred tax assets are recognised only when, on the basis of available evidence, it is more likely than not that there will be taxable profits in the future against which the deferred tax asset can be offset.

(F) BASIS OF VALUATION OF INVESTMENTS

All investments are valued at their fair value as at close of business on the last business day of the financial year.

Quoted investments are valued at fair value which generally is the bid price, excluding any accrued interest in the case of debt securities. Accrued interest on debt securities is included in revenue.

Collective investment schemes are valued at published bid prices for dual priced funds and at published prices for single priced funds.

Open forward currency contracts are valued based on the difference between the contract value and the market value adjusted by the prevailing spot rate and swap curve.

ACCOUNTING AND DISTRIBUTION POLICIES continued

For investments for which there is no quoted price or for which the quoted price is unreliable, fair value is determined by the ACD, taking into account, where appropriate, latest dealing prices, valuations from reliable sources, financial performance, maturity of the company and other relevant factors.

(G) EXCHANGE RATES

The base and functional currency of the sub-funds is pounds sterling. Transactions in foreign currencies are recorded in sterling at the rate ruling at the date of the transactions. Assets and liabilities expressed in foreign currencies at the end of the accounting period are translated into sterling at the exchange rate prevailing at close of business on the last business day of the financial year.

(H) DILUTION LEVY

The ACD may require a dilution levy on the purchase and redemption of shares if, in its opinion, the existing shareholders (for purchases) or remaining shareholders (for redemptions) might otherwise be adversely affected. For example, the dilution levy may be charged in the following circumstances: where the scheme property of a sub-fund is in continual decline; on a sub-fund experiencing large levels of net purchases relative to its size; on 'large deals' (typically being a purchase or redemption of shares to a size exceeding 5% of the Net Asset Value of the relevant sub-fund); in any case where the ACD is of the opinion that the interests of existing or remaining shareholders require the imposition of a dilution levy.

(I) DIRECT TRANSACTION COSTS

Direct transaction costs may consist of fees and commissions paid to agents, advisers, brokers and dealers, levies by regulatory agencies and securities exchanges, and transfer taxes and duties. Debt security investments have no separately identifiable transaction costs as they form part of the dealing spread. Indirect transaction costs may be incurred on transactions in underlying schemes but these do not form part of the direct transaction costs disclosures. Direct transaction costs do not include any difference between the quoted bid and offer prices or internal administrative or holding costs. The average portfolio dealing spread disclosed is the difference between the bid and offer prices of investments at the balance sheet date, including the effect of foreign exchange, expressed as a percentage of the value determined by reference to the offer price.

2. Distribution Policies

Surplus revenue after expenses and taxation, as disclosed in the financial statements, after adjustment for items of a capital nature, is distributable to shareholders. Any deficit of revenue is deducted from capital.

Interim distributions may be made at the ACD's discretion. Final distributions are made in accordance with the COLL Sourcebook.

ACCOUNTING AND DISTRIBUTION POLICIES continued

The ordinary element of stock received in lieu of cash dividends is credited to capital in the first instance followed by a transfer to revenue of the cash equivalent being offered and this forms part of the distributable revenue of the Fund. In the case of an enhanced stock dividend, the value of the enhancement is treated as capital and does not form part of any distribution.

Special dividends are reviewed on a case by case basis in determining whether the dividend is to be treated as revenue or capital. Amounts recognised as revenue will form part of the distributable revenue. Amounts recognised as capital are deducted from the cost of the investment. The tax accounting treatment follows the treatment of the principal amount.

Investment Objective and Policy

The LF Miton Defensive Multi Asset Fund ('the Fund') aims to achieve modestly above inflation returns with lower volatility than equity markets over a five year period, from an actively managed multi asset portfolio of UK and international assets including equities, bonds, and indirectly of both property and commodities.

The Fund also uses the Investment Association Mixed Investment 0-35% Shares sector as a comparator as investors may find it useful to compare the performance of the Fund with the performance of a group of the Fund's peers. Many funds sold in the UK are grouped into sectors by the Investment Association (the trade body that represents UK investment managers), to help investors to compare funds with broadly similar characteristics.

Market Review

The year to the end of June 2020 was very much split into two periods, first up to the end of February and then the period beyond. Until the end of February, markets were in low volatility rising trends, with bond yields steady and the US equity market, particularly Nasdaq, outperforming most others. However, the COVID crisis, which was emerging in the early part of the year, really started to impact more widely, as countries introduced various forms of 'lockdown' policy, leading to huge economic contractions and major market turmoil.

During the highly volatile period from end February to late March, all equity markets collapsed to varying degrees, bond yields fell significantly and corporate spreads widened. There was even a moment where oil prices turned negative. Gold was briefly weak, arguably down to widespread investor liquidation, but ultimately regained its rising trend. In many ways, markets underwent a typical bear market recessionary phase but in accelerated time. Many records were broken, in terms of the fastest fall, biggest recovery months and so on.

The subsequent recovery has been driven by two major factors; one, a belief that the recessions will be short lived, if deep. The other, is the sheer scale of financial market and fiscal intervention. Central banks have used their powers to create unprecedented amounts of liquidity and governments have introduced fiscal support programmes, for individuals and businesses.

Performance Attribution

Despite the turmoil the Fund overall managed to make a positive return of 3.9%¹ in the year. Obviously, during the year there was a great deal of volatility and the fall from the peaks at the end of February was severe. Most of these losses were quickly recovered, however. Over the twelve months, equities, bonds and gold all contributed positively, with only the REIT exposure acting as a drag.

The strongest contributor to returns was our bond portfolio. Government bonds benefited from sharply falling yields during the crisis and hence, contributed very strongly while the corporate bonds benefit from our cautious approach suffering relatively little from the spread widening that occurred. Overall bonds made a useful contribution in the year.

Within equity, our heavy exposure to the US and Europe really helped, despite the European indices being lower in the period. This reflects our heavy bias to quality, growth businesses particularly in our favoured themes. The UK and Asia detracted, but were much smaller positions.

Gold was also a strong contributor, benefiting from its safe haven status.

Disappointingly, REITS detracted over the period, not acting as safe havens during the crisis because of the direct impact on their revenues from the impact of lockdown. Hence this was our only negative asset class.

Portfolio Activity

Steering through the crisis led to a number of major changes to the portfolio. From the middle of 2019, we were reducing equity generally, selling out of a number of weaker positions in the US and the UK and totally exiting Asia, emerging markets and Japan against a strongly rising market. As the crisis took hold, we sold many further positions, particularly in areas directly impacted, such as retail and travel. This took our equity weight even lower.

Also, in the early part of the year we materially increased government bonds and we continued to buy bonds as we sold equities.

From the market lows this process has been largely reversed. We have been buying back into equity while reducing the government bonds. The equity purchases have focussed heavily on quality, thematic, growth businesses in our digital economy and industrial automation themes as well as some renewable energy businesses. We have also added a few more cyclical growth businesses, again focusing on our themes.

We have financed these purchases by selling most of the shorter dated government bonds.

Outlook

In the near term, the market outlook is dominated by the two forces of economic contraction and recovery and exceptionally loose monetary and fiscal policy. Predicting the pace and shape of post lockdown recoveries, in our view, is especially difficult. In general, we avoid making this type of prediction, as we cannot ever have any strong confidence in being able to forecast the future. In this case, it looks like a bet that's simply not worth taking. There are too many moving parts, in terms of impacted industries and businesses and their ability to recover. So, we would prefer to focus on the easier to identify longer term trends, many of which are accelerated by recent events.

Among those trends, clearly the biggest beneficiaries are within our digital revolution theme. The shift to online consumption has moved rapidly in recent months and much of this move is expected to be permanent. The same goes for our automation theme, which benefits from the move from extended supply chains, especially in China towards more local manufacturing. De-globalisation is certainly more rapid than it was pre-COVID. Another theme to get a boost is the new energy theme, with much talk of further investment in infrastructure, particularly green infrastructure, from governments in Europe.

So rather than trying to predict market levels and an unknowable shape to the recovery, we prefer to deal with what we do know about the future economy; there are some clear established themes which are not going away.

15. Risk Management Policies

In pursuing the investment objective a number of financial instruments are held which may comprise securities and other investments, cash balances and debtors and creditors that arise directly from operations. Derivatives, such as futures or forward currency contracts, may be utilised for Efficient Portfolio Management (including hedging) purposes.

The main risks from the Fund's holding of financial instruments, together with the ACD's policy for managing these risks, are set out below:

The ACD has in place a Risk Management Policy and Procedures Document ('RMPPD') that sets out the risks that may impact a fund and how the ACD seeks, where appropriate, to manage, monitor and mitigate those risks, and in particular those risks associated with the use of derivatives. The RMPPD sets out both the framework and the risk mitigations operated by the ACD in managing the identified risks of the Fund. The ACD requires that the appointed Investment Manager to the Fund has in place its own governance structure, policies and procedures that are commensurate with its regulatory obligations and the risks posed by the fund managed.

(A) CREDIT RISK

Credit risk is the risk that a counterparty may be unable or unwilling to make a payment or fulfil contractual obligations. This may be in terms of an actual default or by deterioration in a counterparty's credit quality.

Certain transactions in securities that the Fund enters into expose it to the risk that the counterparty will not deliver the investment for a purchase, or cash for a sale after the Fund has fulfilled its obligations. As part of its due diligence process, the ACD undertakes a review of the controls operated over counterparties by the Investment Manager, including initial and ongoing due diligence and business volumes placed with each counterparty. In cases which are dependent on the counterparty settling at the transaction's maturity date, the ACD has policies in place which set out the minimum credit quality expected of a market counterparty or deposit taker at the outset of the transaction.

(B) INTEREST RATE RISK

Interest rate risk is the risk that the value of the Fund's investments will fluctuate as a result of interest rate changes. The value of fixed interest securities may be affected by changes in interest rates, either globally or locally. Changes in the rate of return in one asset class may influence the valuation basis of other classes. The amount of revenue receivable from floating rate investments and bank balances or payable on bank overdrafts will be affected by fluctuations in interest rates. Investment in collective investment schemes exposes the Fund to indirect interest rate risk to the extent that they invest in interest bearing securities, the returns from which will be affected by fluctuations in interest rates.

for the year ended 30 June 2020

The Fund takes on interest rate risk within its investment portfolio where the ACD and Investment Manager believe that the expected return compensates for the overall risk. The ACD and Investment Manager continue to monitor the level of direct interest rate risk posed by the Fund's underlying investments on a regular basis using the DV01 method. As at 30 June 2020 a one basis point change in the yield would have an impact of £10,000 on the direct net asset of the Fund (30.06.19: £17,000).

(C) FOREIGN CURRENCY RISK

Foreign currency risk is the risk that the Sterling value of investments will fluctuate as a result of exchange rate movements. Assets denominated in currencies other than Sterling will provide direct exposure to currency risk as a consequence of the movement in foreign exchange rates when calculating the Sterling equivalent value. Forward currency contracts are employed by the Investment Manager, where deemed appropriate, to mitigate the foreign exchange risk. Investment in collective investment schemes may provide indirect exposure to currency risk as a consequence of the movement in foreign exchange rates.

Where the Fund invests in non-Sterling assets, foreign currency exposures are managed within parameters utilising forward currency contracts. The details of the contracts in place at the year end are disclosed in the Portfolio Statement.

(D) LEVERAGE

The Fund did not employ any significant leverage in the current or prior year.

(E) LIQUIDITY RISK

The main liability of the Fund is the redemption of any shares that investors want to sell. Investments may have to be sold to fund such redemptions should insufficient cash be held at the bank to meet this obligation.

The ACD monitors the liquidity profile of the Fund on a daily basis. In assessing the liquidity profile of the Fund, the ACD assesses how much of the Fund can be realised in one and five days, under normal and stressed market conditions, and the impact this would have on the overall subsequent liquidity profile. In assessing the liquidity of a company's shares, the ACD utilises the lower of the 5 and 30 day average market volume of that company's

for the year ended 30 June 2020

shares. Where a risk is identified then a more in depth review is undertaken to establish its significance, by assessing the liquidity profile of the Fund against a 25% market participation of the average daily volume. Based on this analysis 94.29% of the portfolio can be liquidated within 5 days and 94.29% within 30 days. Given this and the ACD's understanding of the investor base, it is considered that the liquidity profile of the Fund is appropriate.

All financial liabilities are payable in one year or less, or on demand.

(F) MARKET PRICE RISK

Market price risk is the risk that the value of the Fund's financial instruments will fluctuate as a result of changes in market prices caused by factors other than interest rate or foreign currency movement. Market price risk arises primarily from uncertainty about the future prices of financial instruments that the Fund holds.

Market price risk represents the potential loss the Fund may suffer through holding market positions in the face of price movements. The Fund's investment portfolio is exposed to price fluctuations, which are monitored by the ACD in pursuance of the investment objective and policy. The risk is generally regarded as consisting of two elements – stock specific risk and market risk. Adhering to investment guidelines and avoiding excessive exposure to one particular issuer can limit stock specific risk. Subject to compliance with the investment objective, spreading exposure across a broad range of global stocks can mitigate market risk.

A 5% increase in the value of the Fund's portfolio, excluding forward currency contracts would have the effect of increasing the return and net assets by £2,382,000 (30.06.19: £2,648,000). A 5% decrease would have an equal and opposite effect.

(G) DERIVATIVES

The Investment Manager has employed derivatives for the purposes of hedging with the aim of reducing the risk profile of the Fund, or reducing costs, or generating additional capital or revenue, in accordance with Efficient Portfolio Management (EPM).

18. Subsequent Events

Investment Objective and Policy

The investment objective of the LF Miton Cautious Multi Asset Fund ('the Fund') is to provide long-term growth by investing in a portfolio of other authorised funds, worldwide equities, fixed interest stocks, cash and money market instruments.

The Investment Manager will take a fundamental and value driven approach to portfolio allocation, dependent on the relevant attractions of the world equity, fixed interest and currency markets. The Fund will take an aggressive view of the stock market weightings in the portfolio, when compared to a neutral world market capitalisation.

Benchmarks

The Fund's comparator benchmarks are the Investment Association Mixed Investment 20-60% Shares sector and the FTSE 100 Index.

The Fund's performance may be compared against the following benchmarks (referred to as 'comparator benchmarks'): the FTSE 100 Index and the Investment Association Mixed Investment 20-60% Shares sector.

As the Fund invests in a range of asset classes there is no single index that is reflective of the Fund. The FTSE 100 Index has been selected as a comparator benchmark as we consider it assists in evaluating the Fund's performance and volatility from diverse assets against the performance and volatility of a single well-known asset class that UK investors are able to relate to (large capitalised UK equities) that the Fund may have exposure to. The Fund also uses the Investment Association Mixed Investment 20-60% Shares sector as a comparator as investors may find it useful to compare the performance of the Fund with the performance of a group of the Fund's peers. Many funds sold in the UK are grouped into sectors by the Investment Association (the trade body that represents UK investment managers), to help investors to compare funds with broadly similar characteristics.

Market Review

The year to the end of June 2020 was very much split into two periods, first up to the end of February and then the period beyond. Until the end of February, markets were in low volatility rising trends, with bond yields steady and the US equity market, particularly Nasdaq, outperforming most others. However, the COVID crisis, which was emerging in the early part of the year, really started to impact more widely, as countries introduced various forms of 'lockdown' policy, leading to huge economic contractions and major market turmoil.

During the highly volatile period from end February to late March, all equity markets collapsed to varying degrees, bond yields fell significantly and corporate spreads widened. There was even a moment where oil prices turned negative. Gold was briefly weak, arguably down to widespread investor liquidation, but ultimately regained its rising trend. In many ways, markets underwent a typical bear market recessionary phase but in accelerated time. Many records were broken, in terms of the fastest fall, biggest recovery months and so on.

The subsequent recovery has been driven by two major factors; one, a belief that the recessions will be short lived, if deep. The other, is the sheer scale of financial market and fiscal intervention. Central banks have used their powers to create unprecedented amounts of liquidity and governments have introduced fiscal support programmes, for individuals and businesses.

Performance Attribution

Despite the turmoil the Fund overall managed to make a positive return of 1.4%¹ in the year. Obviously, during the year there was a great deal of volatility and the fall from the peaks at the end of February was severe. Most of these losses were quickly recovered, however. Over the twelve months, equities, bonds and gold all contributed positively, with only the REIT exposure acting as a drag.

Within equity, our heavy exposure to the US and Europe really helped, despite the European indices being lower over the period. This reflects our heavy bias to quality growth businesses, particularly in our favoured themes. Other equity areas, such as the UK, Asia and Emerging markets detracted, but were much smaller positions.

Both our corporate and government bonds contributed to returns. Government bonds benefited from sharply falling yields during the crisis and hence contributed very strongly, while the corporate bonds benefit from our cautious approach, suffering relatively little from the spread widening that occurred. Overall, bonds made a useful contribution in the year.

Gold was also a strong contributor, benefiting from its safe haven status.

Disappointingly, REITS detracted over / during the period, not acting as safe havens during the crisis because of the direct impact on their revenues from lockdown, hence this was our only negative asset class.

Portfolio Activity

Steering through the crisis led to a number of major changes to the portfolio. Having been relatively inactive up to the end of 2019, other than reducing emerging markets exposure, the early part of 2020 led to several major readjustments.

From the middle of 2019, we were reducing equity generally, selling out of a number of weaker positions in the US, UK and Japan, against a strongly rising market. As the crisis took hold, we sold many further positions, particularly in areas directly impacted, such as retail and travel. This took our equity weight even lower.

Also, in the early part of the year, we bought a position in long dated government bonds and we continued to buy bonds as we sold equities, although these were much shorter dated.

From the market lows, this process has been largely reversed. We have been buying back into equity while reducing government bonds. The equity purchases have focussed heavily on quality, thematic growth businesses in our digital economy and industrial automation themes, as well as some renewable energy businesses. We have also added a few more cyclical growth businesses, again focussing on our themes.

We have financed these purchases by selling most of the shorter dated government bonds.

Outlook

In the near term, the market outlook is dominated by the two forces of economic contraction and recovery and exceptionally loose monetary and fiscal policy. Predicting the pace and shape of post lockdown recoveries, in our view, is especially difficult. In general, we avoid making this type of prediction, as we cannot ever have any strong confidence in being able to forecast the future. In this case, it looks like a bet that's simply not worth taking. There are too many moving parts, in terms of impacted industries and businesses and their ability to recover. So, we would prefer to focus on the easier to identify longer term trends, many of which are accelerated by recent events.

Among those trends, clearly the biggest beneficiaries are within our digital revolution theme. The shift to online consumption has moved rapidly in recent months and much of this move is expected to be permanent. The same goes for our automation theme, which benefits from the move from extended supply chains, especially in China towards more local manufacturing. De-globalisation is certainly more rapid than it was pre-COVID. Another theme to get a boost is the new energy theme, with much talk of further investment in infrastructure, particularly green infrastructure, from governments in Europe.

So rather than trying to predict market levels and an unknowable shape to the recovery, we prefer to deal with what we do know about the future economy; there are some clear established themes which are not going away.

15. Risk Management Policies

In pursuing the investment objective a number of financial instruments are held which may comprise securities and other investments, cash balances and debtors and creditors that arise directly from operations. Derivatives, such as futures or forward currency contracts, may be utilised for Efficient Portfolio Management (including hedging) purposes.

The main risks from the Fund's holding of financial instruments, together with the ACD's policy for managing these risks, are set out below:

The ACD has in place a Risk Management Policy and Procedures Document ('RMPPD') that sets out the risks that may impact a fund and how the ACD seeks, where appropriate, to manage, monitor and mitigate those risks, and in particular those risks associated with the use of derivatives. The RMPPD sets out both the framework and the risk mitigations operated by the ACD in managing the identified risks of the Fund. The ACD requires that the appointed Investment Manager to the Fund has in place its own governance structure, policies and procedures that are commensurate with its regulatory obligations and the risks posed by the fund managed.

(A) CREDIT RISK

Credit risk is the risk that a counterparty may be unable or unwilling to make a payment or fulfil contractual obligations. This may be in terms of an actual default or by deterioration in a counterparty's credit quality.

Certain transactions in securities that the Fund enters into expose it to the risk that the counterparty will not deliver the investment for a purchase, or cash for a sale after the Fund has fulfilled its obligations. As part of its due diligence process, the ACD undertakes a review of the controls operated over counterparties by the Investment Manager, including initial and ongoing due diligence and business volumes placed with each counterparty. In cases ACD has policies in place which set out the minimum credit quality expected of a market counterparty or deposit taker at the outset of the transaction.

(B) INTEREST RATE RISK

Interest rate risk is the risk that the value of the Fund's investments will fluctuate as a result of interest rate changes. The value of fixed interest securities may be affected by changes in interest rates, either globally or locally. Changes in the rate of return in one asset class may influence the valuation basis of other classes. The amount of revenue receivable from floating rate investments and bank balances or payable on bank overdrafts will be affected by fluctuations in interest rates. Investment in collective investment schemes exposes the Fund to indirect interest rate risk to the extent that they invest in interest bearing securities, the returns from which will be affected by fluctuations in interest rates.

The Fund takes on interest rate risk within its investment portfolio where the ACD and Investment Manager believe that the expected return compensates for the overall risk. The ACD and Investment Manager continue to monitor the level of direct interest rate risk posed by the Fund's underlying investments on a regular basis using the DV01 method. As at 30 June 2020, a one basis point change in the yield would have an impact of £83,000 on the direct net assets of the Fund (30.06.19: £129,0000).

(C) FOREIGN CURRENCY RISK

Foreign currency risk is the risk that the Sterling value of investments will fluctuate as a result of exchange rate movements. Assets denominated in currencies other than Sterling will provide direct exposure to currency risk as a consequence of the movement in foreign exchange rates when calculating the Sterling equivalent value. Forward currency contracts are employed by the Investment Manager, where deemed appropriate, to mitigate the foreign exchange risk. Investment in collective investment schemes may provide indirect exposure to currency risk as a consequence of the movement in foreign exchange rates.

Where the Fund invests in non-Sterling assets, foreign currency exposures are managed within parameters utilising forward currency contracts. The details of the contracts in place at the year end are disclosed in the Portfolio Statement.

In assessing the liquidity profile of the Fund, the ACD assesses how much of the Fund can be realised in one and five days, under normal and stressed market conditions, and the impact this would have on the overall subsequent liquidity profile. In assessing the liquidity of a company's shares, the ACD utilises the lower of the 5 and 30 day average market volume of that company's shares. Where a risk is identified then a more in depth review is undertaken to establish its significance, by assessing the liquidity profile of the Fund against a 25% market participation of the average daily volume. Based on this analysis 83.71% of the portfolio can be liquidated within 5 days and 90.76% within 30 days. Given this and the ACD's understanding of the investor base, it is considered that the liquidity profile of the Fund is appropriate.

All financial liabilities are payable in one year or less, or on demand.

(F) MARKET PRICE RISK

Market price risk is the risk that the value of the Fund's financial instruments will fluctuate as a result of changes in market prices caused by factors other than interest rate or foreign currency movement. Market price risk arises primarily from uncertainty about the future prices of financial instruments that the Fund holds.

Market price risk represents the potential loss the Fund may suffer through holding market positions in the face of price movements. The Fund's investment portfolio is exposed to price fluctuations, which are monitored by the ACD in pursuance of the investment objective and policy. The risk is generally regarded as consisting of two elements – stock specific risk and market risk. Adhering to investment guidelines and avoiding excessive exposure to one particular issuer can limit stock specific risk. Subject to compliance with the investment objective, spreading exposure across a broad range of global stocks can mitigate market risk.

A 5% increase in the value of the Fund's portfolio, excluding forward currency contracts would have the effect of increasing the return and net assets by £20,459,000 (30.06.19: £23,267,000). A 5% decrease would have an equal and opposite effect.

(G) DERIVATIVES

The Investment Manager has employed derivatives for the purposes of hedging with the aim of reducing the risk profile of the Fund, or reducing costs, or generating additional capital or revenue, in accordance with Efficient Portfolio Management (EPM).

Investment Objective and Policy

The LF Miton Balanced Multi Asset Fund ('the Fund') aims to achieve long-term (greater than five years) capital growth.

The Fund will aim to achieve the investment objective by investing in a portfolio of global mixed assets comprising of equities, fixed income securities, property and commodities. Whilst a combination of asset classes will always be held, not all asset classes will necessarily be held all the time, with the exception of equities and equity related securities (such as ordinary and preference shares, global depositary receipts and American depositary receipts) listed or traded on Regulated Markets. Investments in equities and fixed income securities will be of a direct nature, and exposure will be gained indirectly in property and commodities. It is expected that equities will be the most significant holding in the portfolio most of the time. The Fund may also invest in collective investment schemes (open and closed funds), money market instruments, cash, and potentially higher risk areas, such as emerging market equities and sub investment grade bonds.

The Fund may use derivatives and forward transactions for the purposes of Efficient Portfolio Management.

Benchmarks

The Fund's comparator benchmarks are the Investment Association Mixed Investment 40-85% Shares sector and the FTSE 100 Index.

The Fund's performance may be compared against the following benchmarks (referred to as 'comparator benchmarks'): the FTSE 100 Index and the Investment Association Mixed Investment 40-85% Shares sector.

As the Fund invests in a range of asset classes there is no single index that is reflective of the Fund. The FTSE 100 Index has been selected as a comparator benchmark as we consider it assists in evaluating the Fund's performance and volatility from diverse assets against the performance and volatility of a single well-known asset class that UK investors are able to relate to (large capitalised UK equities) that the Fund may have exposure to. The Fund also uses the Investment Association Mixed Investment 40-85% Shares sector as a comparator as investors may find it useful to compare the performance of the Fund with the performance of a group of the Fund's peers. Many funds sold in the UK are grouped into sectors by the Investment Association (the trade body that represents UK investment managers), to help investors to compare funds with broadly similar characteristics.

Market Review

The year to the end of June 2020 was very much split into two periods, first up to the end of February and then the period beyond. Until the end of February markets were in low volatility rising trends, with bond yields steady and the US equity market, particularly Nasdaq outperforming most others. However, the COVID crisis, which was emerging in the early part of the year, really started to impact more widely as countries introduced various forms of 'lockdown' policy, leading to huge economic contractions and major market turmoil.

During the highly volatile period from end February to late March, all equity markets collapsed to varying degrees, bond yields fell significantly and corporate spreads widened. There was even a moment where oil prices turned negative. Gold was briefly weak, arguably down to widespread investor liquidation, but ultimately regained its rising trend. In many ways markets underwent a typical bear market recessionary phase but in quick time. Many records were broken, in terms of the fastest fall, biggest recovery months and so on.

The subsequent recovery has been driven by two major factors, one a belief that the recessions will be short lived, if deep. The other is the sheer scale of financial market and fiscal intervention. Central banks have used their powers to create unprecedented amounts of liquidity and governments have introduced fiscal support programmes for individuals and businesses.

Performance Attribution

Despite the turmoil the Fund overall managed to make a positive return of 2.9%¹ in the year. Obviously, during the year there was a great deal of volatility and the fall from the peaks at the end of February was severe. Most of these losses were quickly recovered, however. Over the twelve months equities, bonds and gold all contributed positively, with only the REIT exposure acting as a drag.

Within equity, our heavy exposure to the US and Europe really helped, despite the European indices being lower over the period. This reflects our heavy bias to quality, growth businesses particularly in our favoured themes. Other equity areas such as the UK, Asia and Emerging markets detracted, but were much smaller positions.

The bulk of our fixed income was in long dated developed government bonds and these benefited from sharply falling yields during the crisis and hence, contributed very strongly during that period, mitigating falls in equity. Overall, over the year bonds made a useful contribution.

Gold was also a strong contributor, benefiting from its safe haven status.

Disappointingly, REITS detracted in the period, not acting as safe havens during the crisis because of the direct impact on their revenues from the impact of lockdowns; hence this was our only negative asset class.

Portfolio Activity

Steering through the crisis led to a number of major changes to the portfolio. Having been relatively inactive up to the end of 2019, other than reducing emerging markets exposure, the early part of 2020 led to several major readjustments.

In the early period of 2020, we were reducing equity generally, selling out of a number of weaker positions in the US, UK and Japan, against a strongly rising market. As the crisis took hold, we sold many further positions, particularly in areas directly impacted, such as retail and travel. This took our equity weight even lower.

Also, in the early part of the year we bought a position in long dated government bonds and we continued to buy bonds as we sold equities, although these were much shorter dated.

From the market lows this process has been largely reversed. We have been buying back into equity while reducing government bonds. The equity purchases have focussed heavily on quality, thematic, growth businesses in our digital economy and industrial automation themes as well as some renewable energy businesses. We have also added a few more cyclical growth businesses, again focussing on our themes.

We have financed these purchases by selling most of the shorter dated government bonds.

Outlook

In the near term the market outlook is dominated by the two forces of economic contraction and recovery and exceptionally loose monetary and fiscal policy. Predicting the pace and shape of post lockdown recoveries in our view is especially difficult. In general, we avoid making this type of prediction, as we cannot ever have any strong confidence in knowledge about the future. In this case it looks like a bet that's simply not worth taking, there are too many moving parts in terms of impacted industries and businesses and their ability to recover. So, we would prefer to focus on the easier to identify longer term trends, many of which are accelerated by recent events.

Among those trends, clearly the biggest beneficiaries are within our digital revolution theme, the shift to online consumption has moved rapidly in recent months and much of this move is expected to be permanent. The same goes for our automation theme, which benefits from the move from extended supply chains, especially in China towards more local manufacturing. Deglobalisation is certainly more rapid post-COVID. Another theme to get a boost is the new energy theme, with much talk of further investment in infrastructure, particularly green infrastructure, from governments in Europe.

So rather than trying to predict market levels and an unknowable shape to the recovery we prefer to deal with what we do know about the future economy; there are some clear established themes which are not going away.

14. Risk Management Policies

In pursuing the investment objective a number of financial instruments are held which may comprise securities and other investments, cash balances and debtors and creditors that arise directly from operations. Derivatives, such as futures or forward currency contracts, may be utilised for Efficient Portfolio Management (including hedging) purposes.

The main risks from the Fund's holding of financial instruments, together with the ACD's policy for managing these risks, are set out below:

The ACD has in place a Risk Management Policy and Procedures Document ('RMPPD') that sets out the risks that may impact a fund and how the ACD seeks, where appropriate, to manage, monitor and mitigate those risks, and in particular those risks associated with the use of derivatives. The RMPPD sets out both the framework and the risk mitigations operated by the ACD in managing the identified risks of the Fund. The ACD requires that the appointed Investment Manager to the Fund has in place its own governance structure, policies and procedures that are commensurate with its regulatory obligations and the risks posed by the fund managed.

(A) CREDIT RISK

Credit risk is the risk that a counterparty may be unable or unwilling to make a payment or fulfil contractual obligations. This may be in terms of an actual default or by deterioration in a counterparty's credit quality.

Certain transactions in securities that the Fund enters into expose it to the risk that the counterparty will not deliver the investment for a purchase, or cash for a sale after the Fund has fulfilled its obligations. As part of its due diligence process, the ACD undertakes a review of the controls operated over counterparties by the Investment Manager, including initial and ongoing due diligence and business volumes placed with each counterparty. In cases which are dependent on the counterparty settling at the transaction's maturity date, the ACD has policies in place which set out the minimum credit quality expected of a market counterparty or deposit taker at the outset of the transaction.

(B) INTEREST RATE RISK

Interest rate risk is the risk that the value of the Fund's investments will fluctuate as a result of interest rate changes. The value of fixed interest securities may be affected by changes in interest rates, either globally or locally. Changes in the rate of return in one asset class may influence the valuation basis of other classes. The amount of revenue receivable from floating rate investments and bank balances or payable on bank overdrafts will be affected by fluctuations in interest rates. Investment in collective investment schemes exposes the Fund to indirect interest rate risk to the extent that they invest in interest bearing securities, the returns from which will be affected by fluctuations in interest rates.

The Fund takes on interest rate risk within its investment portfolio where the ACD and Investment Manager believe that the expected return compensates for the overall risk. The ACD and Investment Manager continue to monitor the level of interest rate risk posed by the Fund's underlying investments on a regular basis. The Fund may indirectly be exposed to interest rate risk through its investment in collective investment schemes. As the Fund has no significant direct exposure to interest rate risk, no sensitivity analysis has been presented.

(C) FOREIGN CURRENCY RISK

Foreign currency risk is the risk that the Sterling value of investments will fluctuate as a result of exchange rate movements. Assets denominated in currencies other than Sterling will provide direct exposure to currency risk as a consequence of the movement in foreign exchange rates when calculating the Sterling equivalent value. Forward currency contracts are employed by the Investment Manager, where deemed appropriate, to mitigate the foreign exchange risk. Investment in collective investment schemes may provide indirect exposure to currency risk as a consequence of the movement in foreign exchange rates.

Where the Fund invests in non-Sterling assets, foreign currency exposures are managed within parameters utilising forward currency contracts.

(D) LEVERAGE

The Fund did not employ any significant leverage during the current and prior year.

(E) LIQUIDITY RISK

The main liability of the Fund is the redemption of any shares that investors want to sell. Investments may have to be sold to fund such redemptions should insufficient cash be held at the bank to meet this obligation.

The ACD monitors the liquidity profile of the Fund on a daily basis. In assessing the liquidity profile of the Fund, the ACD assesses how much of the Fund can be realised in one and five days, under normal and stressed market conditions, and the impact this would have on the overall subsequent liquidity profile. In assessing the liquidity

for the year ended 30 June 2020

of a company's shares, the ACD utilises the lower of the 5 and 30 day average market volume of that company's shares. Where a risk is identified then a more in depth review is undertaken to establish its significance, by assessing the liquidity profile of the Fund against a 25% market participation of the average daily volume. Based on this analysis 99.45% of the portfolio can be liquidated within 5 days and 99.78% within 30 days. Given this and the ACD's understanding of the investor base, it is considered that the liquidity profile of the Fund is appropriate.

All financial liabilities are payable in one year or less, or on demand.

(F) MARKET PRICE RISK

Market price risk is the risk that the value of the Fund's financial instruments will fluctuate as a result of changes in market prices caused by factors other than interest rate or foreign currency movement. Market price risk arises primarily from uncertainty about the future prices of financial instruments that the Fund holds.

Market price risk represents the potential loss the Fund may suffer through holding market positions in the face of price movements. The Fund's investment portfolio is exposed to price fluctuations, which are monitored by the ACD in pursuance of the investment objective and policy. The risk is generally regarded as consisting of two elements – stock specific risk and market risk. Adhering to investment guidelines and avoiding excessive exposure to one particular issuer can limit stock specific risk. Subject to compliance with the investment objective, spreading exposure across a broad range of global stocks can mitigate market risk.

A 5% increase in the value of the Fund's portfolio excluding forward currency contracts would have the effect of increasing the return and net assets by £82,000 (30.06.19: £92,000). A 5% decrease would have an equal and opposite effect.

(G) DERIVATIVES

The Investment Manager has employed derivatives for the purposes of hedging with the aim of reducing the risk profile of the Fund, or reducing costs, or generating additional capital or revenue, in accordance with Efficient Portfolio Management (EPM).
